2017 Abortion Report: Planned Parenthood drives up abortion numbers in Minnesota

Long-term abortion decline has leveled off during the last two years

ABORTIONS IN MINNESOTA increased slightly in 2017 thanks to the state's leading performer and promoter of abortion. Planned Parenthood grew its own abortion total by 11 percent while non-Planned Parenthood abortion centers saw a 10 percent drop.


"Planned Parenthood likes to take credit when abortions go down," said MCCL Executive

Director Scott Fischbach. "That's simply bizarre. because abortion is Planned Parenthood's business, and Planned Parenthood is dominating the market. No organization or group does more to keep abortion numbers high."

Planned Parenthood hits record high

The Minnesota Department of Health's annual Abortion Report, released in late June, shows that 10,177 abortions took place in the state last year, a three percent increase since 2015, when abortions hit their lowest level since 1974. The abortion rate rose from 8.4 (abortions per 1,000 women of reproductive age) in 2015 to 8.7 in 2017.

Despite the recent plateau, abortions in

Why pro-life elected officials are absolutely essential

THE 2017 ABORTION REPORT, which was released last month by the Minnesota Department of Health, showed that abortions increased slightly in Minnesota for the second straight year.

This recent rise is contrary to Minnesota's longterm trend of declining abortions.

Abortions have dropped in seven of the last 10 years and have fallen 26 percent since 2007. Thanks to factors like pro-life education, ultrasounds, pregnancy care centers, and pro-life laws like Woman's Right to Know and Positive Alternatives, women are more likely to reject abortion today than in the past.

But with the slight increase over the last two years, the long-term abortion decline in our state seems, for the moment, to have stalled.

Pro-life bills have been vetoed

The harmful influence of Planned Parenthood is a huge factor in keeping abortion numbers higher than they otherwise would be. But there's also the inability to enact new abortion-reducing pro-life legislation.

The Legislature has passed numerous MCCL-backed pro-life bills in recent years. But those bill have consistently been vetoed by Gov. Mark Dayton. They include legislation to end the taxpayer funding of abortion, legislation to protect unborn children who can feel pain, and legislation to hold abortion centers to basic health and safety standards.

They also include a bill this year to ensure that women are given the chance to see their ultrasounds prior to abortion.

All of it would have made a real difference. And all of it was vetoed. Every one of those bills would be law if we had a pro-life governor!

Pro-life laws save lives

This is why elections are so important. Pro-life laws reduce abortions, help and empower women, and save the lives of unborn children.

The candidates we vote for really matter. The lives of unborn children are actually on the line.

We can see this with laws like Minnesota's

parental notification requirement (which has dramatically reduced minor abortions), Woman's Right to Know law (which has empowered abortionvulnerable women with information), and Positive Alternatives program (which has provided needed assistance and support to pregnant women).

But only with both a pro-life Legislature and a pro-life governor can additional measures be enacted!

Lives are on the line

So in this fall's election, we need to vote for pro-life law makers in order to maintain the current pro-life majority in the Legislature. No pro-life progress is possible without them.

But we also need, after eight long years of a pro-abortion governor, to elect a pro-life replacement to the governor's office in November.

Remember this as you vote in the Aug. 14 primary election and then in the Nov. 6 general election. The candidates we vote for really matter. The lives of unborn children are actually on the line. MCCL

PRO-LIFE LAWS

MCCL and our national affiliate, National Right to Life Committee (NRLC), have supported the passage of many pieces of lifesaving legislation on the federal level.

1. Will you use your vote to maintain any pro-life law or policy that is in effect on the day that you are elected?

INCREMENTAL STRATEGY

MCCL and NRLC have a proven record of crafting and implementing a strategic plan for creating a pro-life nation. This strategic plan involves an incremental approach which allows for the greatest number of lives saved while working toward our ultimate goal of establishing respect for human life in our laws and culture.

2. Will you vote for lifesaving legislation that advances this incremental approach and provides protections for the unborn and their mothers?

ABORTION INDUSTRY FUNDING

The federal government is often asked for funding for the abortion industry, including subsidies for abortion and abortion providers as well as foreign aid for abortion industry subsidies and abortion advocacy. Even many who support abortion are not supportive of using taxpayer funds to support abortion.

3. Will you vote to limit and to prohibit taxpayer funding of the abortion industry?

LIFE-DESTRUCTIVE RESEARCH

4. Would you vote for legislation to prevent federal support of research that harms or destroys human life at any stage of development, or that uses cells or tissues that are obtained by harming or killing human life at any stage of development?

DENIAL OF LIFESAVING MEDICAL CARE

Numerous policies have been sought, and in some cases made law, that deny patients health care based on quality of life criteria. Examples include the creation through the Affordable Care Act of the Independent Payment Advisory Board (IPAB) and hospitals that have implemented formal policies authorizing denial of lifesaving medical treatment against the will of a patient or the patient's family if an ethics committee thinks the patient's so-called "quality of life" is unacceptable, even though the patient and family disagree.

5. Will you vote to prohibit involuntary denial of lifesaving medical treatment against the will of the patient?

ASSISTED SUICIDE

Across the country, there are increasing efforts to legalize assisted suicide.

6. Will you vote against any attempts to legalize assisted suicide?

FREE SPEECH RIGHTS

As a grassroots advocacy organization that is committed to working within the legislative process, MCCL has always had an interest in issues that affect elections. We are strongly committed to maintaining free-speech rights in order to maximize our ability to communicate with our members and the public without restrictive administrative burdens.

Tina Smith, former abortion industry executive, aims to keep Franken's U.S. Senate seat

She's running against pro-life state Sen. Karin Housley

"I'M ... THE ONLY SENATOR who has ever worked at Planned Parenthood." said Tina Smith recently on the steps of the U.S. Supreme Court, where she was protesting the nomination of Judge Brett Kavanaugh (whom she fears may "cast that decisive fifth vote to overturn Roe [v. Wade]").

Smith served as a vice president at Planned Parenthood's Minnesota affiliate. It's a job about which she's not afraid to boast. She told the Star Tribune in January that she's "very proud" of the organization's work.

Planned Parenthood ended the lives of 6,234 human beings in Minnesota last year.

Planned Parenthood tenure

During Smith's tenure in the abortion industry (2003-2006), Planned Parenthood increased its annual abortion total by 22 percent and became the state's leading abortion **practitioner** (it has only grown its dominance of the market in the years since).

Smith also lobbied against Minnesota's Woman's Right to Know law, which ensures informed consent prior to abortion, and Minnesota's Positive Alternatives program, which empowers women who want to keep their babies by providing support and alternatives.

Sarah Stoesz, the president and CEO of Planned Parenthood in Minnesota, later told the Star Tribune: "[Smith] really built our education and outreach efforts. She's got a pretty strong legacy around here."

Against protection for unborn

Smith went on to serve as Gov. Mark Dayton's chief of staff and then his lieutenant governor—a period during which Dayton vetoed numerous pro-life bills—before Dayton appointed her to replace Al Franken in the U.S. Senate following Franken's resignation.

Since taking office early this year, Smith has voted against protection for unborn children after 20

weeks, when they can experience pain while being dismembered. She also voted against the confirmation offormer Minnesota Supreme Court Justice David Stras to the Eighth Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals, despite his bipartisan support (including support by Sen. Amy Klobuchar) and a "unanimously well qualified" rating by the American Bar Association.

And she has promised to vote against Kavanaugh's confirmation to the U.S. Supreme Court. Kavanaugh, a federal judge whose experience and qualifications are considered beyond reproach, believes that judges "must interpret the law, not make the law," he explained in his post-nomination remarks.

Housley is pro-life alternative

Smith is now running to keep her Senate seat in a special election. Her Republican-endorsed opponent is state Sen. Karin Housley. Housley has consistently voted for pro-life measures in the state Legislature, and has already earned the endorsement of the MCCL Federal PAC and other pro-life organizations.

"Life is a gift, and it should be protected," Housley writes on her website. "As a mother and grandmother, I believe every effort should be made to protect and honor life." MCCL

Minnesota have dropped 47 percent since their high in 1980.

Planned Parenthood, however, performed a record-high 6,234 abortions in 2017—giving the organization a record-high 61 percent share of the state's abortion market. It has increased its abortions by 58 percent just since 2008 (overall abortions in the state have dropped 21 percent over the same period) and doubled its market share.

Whole Woman's Health, the second leading provider of abortion, performed 2,012 abortions in 2017—a 15 percent decline compared to the previous year.

Pro-life legislation is crucial

The 2017 data show some positive developments. Minor abortions dropped from 292 in 2016 to 248 in 2017, just 2.4 percent of all abortions. With the help of Minnesota's 1981 parental notification law, abortions on minors have plummeted 89 percent from their 1980 peak of 2,327.

A total of 11,338 abortion-seeking women received Woman's Right to Know informed consent information in 2017. That means 1,161 women opted against abortion after receiving information about risks and alternatives.

"Woman's Right to Know and Minnesota's other pro-life laws continue to empower women and save lives from abortion," said Fischbach. "But more pro-life measures are needed to reduce abortions further and counteract Planned Parenthood's influence. That's why electing a pro-life governor—someone who will sign pro-life legislation into law—is so crucial." MCCL

MINNESOTA LEGISLATIVE CANDIDATES **ANSWER MCCLSURVEY**

FOLLOWING ARE RESPONSES of candidates for the Minnesota House of Representatives (and one special Senate race) to the questions on this page. Use the response key below to interpret the chart. You are represented by one state representative.

Incumbents' pro-life voting records for the last year (2018) are listed following their responses to the MCCL questionnaire. You may wish to compare incumbents' responses with their pro-life voting record.

(Minor party candidates without a primary opponent in their party are not listed here, but will be included in the General Election issue of MCCL News.)

MCCL has supported the passage of many pieces of lifesaving legislation. These include, but are not limited to, parental notice for minors seeking an abortion; informed consent, including information on fetal pain and the offering of pain reducing drugs for the unborn child during an abortion; abortion reporting requirements, and providing grants to organizations that offer positive alternatives to abortion. Will you vote to maintain previously passed MCCL-supported laws and provisions?

MCCL has a proven record of lifes a ving victories at the Legislature, each carefully crafted to further our strategic plan for creating a pro-life Minnesota. This strategic plan involves an incremental approach which allows for the greatest number of lives saved while working toward our ultimate goal of establishing respect for human life in our laws and culture. Will you vote for lifesaving legislation that advances MCCL's incremental approach and provides protections for the unborn and their mothers?

Even many who support abortion are opposed to taxpayer funding of abortion. Will you vote to limit and to prohibit taxpayer funding of abortion in Minnesota?

Biological-related technologies have been advancing rapidly in recent years. While most of these developments offer great promise, some require that another human life at an early stage of development be harmed or killed (e.g., embryonic stem cell research, human cloning). Do you believe that the state should provide protections for nascent humans against biological research and technologies?


MCCL has worked with elected officials to protect vulnerable Minnesotans and those who are nearing the end of their lives. Many protective laws have been passed including a prohibition on assisting suicide or assisting an attempted suicide (MN Statute 609.215), and a provision requiring health care providers to "take all reasonable steps" to comply with requests for nutrition, hydration or health care that "has a significant possibility of sustaining" a patient's life and allowing for transfer of such patients to receive care elsewhere if the provider is unwilling to provide the care (MN Statute 145C.15). Will you vote against any attempt to weaken or rescind the MCCL-supported laws cited above?

Legislationwasintroduced to legalize assisted suicide (S.F. 1572/H.F. 1885) for certain individuals. Will you vote against any attempts to legalize assisted suicide in Minnesota?

MCCL respects the right of patients and/ or their proxies to make medical decisions. Additionally, MCCL is opposed to any efforts that seek to force medical decisions on others which are based on quality of life criteria. Will you oppose efforts that replace the patient (or proxy) with government standards in regard to medical decision-making, resulting in rationing of care?

As a grassroots advocacy organization that is committed to working within the legislative and judicial processes, MCCL has always had an interest in issues that affect elections. We are strongly committed to maintaining free-speech rights in order to maximize our ability to communicate with our members and the public without restrictive administrative burdens, and we support fair, secure elections between competing candidates. Do you share MCCL's commitment to maintaining free-speech rights for non-profits and PACs and to insisting on fair, secure elections between competing candidates? MCCL

end of their lives. Many protective laws have been passed including a prohibition on assisting suicide or assisting an attempted suicide (MN Statute 609.215), and a provision requiring health care providers to "take all reasonable steps" to comply with requests for nutrition, hydration or health care that "has a significant possibility of sustaining" a patient's life and allowing for transfer of such patients to receive care elsewhere if the provider is unwilling to provide the care (MN Statute 145C.15). 

Keith Ellison enters race for attorney general pledging to oppose pro-life laws

Advocate of no-limits abortion seeks to become state's top law enforcement official

WHEN LORI SWANSON, Minnesota's current attorney general, decided to run for governor, Keith Ellison quickly jumped into the race to fill her position.

EllisonhasrepresentedMinnesota's5thcongressional district (which includes Minneapolis) in the U.S. House since 2007. His record and his agenda for the attorney general's office should deeply concern pro-life Minnesotans.

Ellison won't defend pro-life laws

Ellison has compiled a zero percent pro-life voting record during his 12 years in Congress, according to

National Right to Life—including numerous votes in favor of late-term abortion, taxpayer funding of abortion, and taxpayer funding of abortion industry leader Planned Parenthood.

Minnesota's attorney general is the state's chief law enforcement official, but Ellison suggests that, if elected to the job, he might enforce only those laws with which he agrees. Shortly after entering the race, he "said ... he won't defend new abortion restrictions in court if state lawmakers approve them," MPR News reported.

"I find that there is a right to reproductive health"—a term used in this context as a euphemism for the right to kill human beings before they are born—"in the Minnesota constitution and the federal constitution," Ellison said at a July 2 news conference, "so if the state Legislature tries to make me to defend an unconstitutional law, I wouldn't be able to do that."

Ellison has been endorsed for attorney general by NARAL Pro-Choice Minnesota. "We must be prepared to use every tool we have to protect access to legal abortion in Minnesota," said the group's executive director. "Keith Ellison has demonstrated time and time again that he is willing to fight for reproductive rights."

Wardlow aims to protect unborn

Ellison is running against former state Rep. Doug Wardlow, the Republicanendorsed candidate for attorney general. Wardlow, a graduate of Georgetown's law school, has practiced constitutional law with Alliance Defending Freedom, a pro-life legal advocacy group.

On his website, Wardlow draws a sharp contrast with Ellison by promising to defend laws "passed [to] protect the lives of unborn children." MCCL
