PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



The stakes are high: Why we should prioritize life on Election Day

WHEN YOU HEAD TO THE POLLS on Nov. 6, remember the importance of the right to life. And remember exactly what is at stake.

Candidates will make life-or-death difference

Abortion isn't like other political issues. With abortion, a whole class of innocent human beings is denied the basic protection of the law and allowed to be killed on a massive scale. The moral gravity of this issue makes it a uniquely important problem in American society today.

Laws and public policies, moreover, can have a major effect on the practice of abortion (see article on right). They can increase or decrease protection for unborn children. They can increase or decrease the number of unborn children killed. They can help women find positive and compassionate alternatives to abortion—or fund Planned Parenthood instead.

And the candidates we elect to office determine what our laws will be. Elections make a life-ordeath difference

Races have huge implications

A number of crucial races will be on your ballot in this election:

Minnesota House. A pro-life majority in the Minnesota House is necessary to pass any pro-life legislation. That majority is on the line in November.

Governor. A pro-life governor is necessary to sign pro-life bills into law. Over the last eight years, numerous pro-life bills—measures that would have reduced abortions and saved lives—were vetoed by Gov. Dayton.

Tim Walz and Jeff Johnson are now running to replace him. Walz promises the same no-limitsever approach to abortion, opposing any and all pro-life legislation. Johnson, by contrast, is strongly pro-life and supports protection for unborn children and their mothers.

Attorney General. The attorney general is Minnesota's chief law enforcement official, but Keith Ellison, who supports unlimited abortion, is running for the job promising that he won't defend pro-life laws if they are challenged in court. His opponent, Doug Wardlow, is pro-life and pledges to defend laws protecting the unborn.

U.S. Senate. Both of Minnesota's U.S. Senate seats are on the ballot this year. Control of the Senate will determine, among other things, whether good judges can be confirmed to the federal judiciary, which often decides whether pro-life laws are upheld or thrown out.

In one Senate race, Karin Housley, who is pro-life, faces Tina Smith, who was an executive at Planned Parenthood. Smith opposes all protection for unborn children. In the other race, Jim Newberger, who is pro-life, faces Amy Klobuchar, who supports abortion.

U.S. House. Minnesota's eight U.S. House seats are all on the ballot, and four are expected to be very close races. A pro-life majority in the House is necessary for any federal pro-life legislation to be passed.

In Minnesota's 1st Congressional District, pro-life Jim Hagedorn faces pro-abortion Dan Feehan. In the 2nd District, pro-life Jason Lewis faces pro-abortion Angie Craig. In the 3rd, pro-life Erik Paulsen faces pro-abortion Dean Phillips. And in the 8th, pro-life Pete Stauber faces pro-abortion Joe Radinovich.

HOW PRO-LIFE LAWS SAVE LIVES

The election of pro-life candidates leads to pro-life laws that reduce abortions BY PAUL STARK

SOME PEOPLE BELIEVE that the election of pro-life candidates to public office does nothing to reduce abortions or protect unborn children. But that's simply not true.

The success of pro-life candidates has led to the enactment of pro-life laws and policies at both the state and federal level. And those laws have saved many lives from abortion.

LAWS REDUCE ABORTIONS

Although legalized abortion is (currently) required by the U.S. Supreme Court, certain laws can still be enacted for the benefit of unborn children and their mothers. And a substantial body of research shows that these pro-life measures (e.g., informed consent, parental involvement, bans on taxpayer funding of abortion) help to modestly but significantly reduce the incidence of abortion.

Consider some of the evidence here in Minnesota:

- The Woman's Right to Know informed consent law was enacted in 2003. Under this law in 2017 alone, 1,161 abortion-minded pregnant women opted against abortion after receiving basic factual information about abortion risks and alternatives
- The Positive Alternatives Act of 2005 created a program to provide grants to pregnancy care centers and other programs that assist women

Congressional candidates respond to survey

PRO-LIFE LAWS

MCCL and our national affiliate, National Right to Life Committee (NRLC), have supported the passage of many pieces of lifesaving legislation on the federal level.

that harms or destroys human life at any stage of development, or that uses cells or tissues that are obtained by harming or killing human life at any stage of development?

DENIAL OF LIFESAVING MEDICAL CARE

Numerous policies have been sought, and in some cases made law, that deny patients health care based on quality of life criteria. Examples include the creation through the Affordable Care Act of the Independent Payment Advisory Board (IPAB) and hospitals that have implemented formal policies authorizing denial of lifesaving medical treatment against the will of a patient or the patient's family if an ethics committee thinks the patient's so-called "quality of life" is unacceptable, even though the patient and family disagree.

5. Will you vote to prohibit involuntary denial of lifesaving medical treatment against the will of the patient?

ASSISTED SUICIDE

Across the country, there are increasing efforts to legalize assisted suicide.

6. Will you vote against any attempts to legalize assisted suicide?

FREE SPEECH RIGHTS

As a grassroots advocacy organization that is committed to working within the legislative process, MCCL has always had an interest in issues that affect elections. FOLLOWING ARE RESPONSES of candidates for the Minnesota House of Representatives (and one special Senate race) to the guestions on this page. Use the response key below to interpret the chart. You are represented by one state representative.

Incumbents' pro-life voting records for the last year (2018) are listed following their responses to the MCCL questionnaire. You may wish to compare incumbents' responses with their pro-life voting record.

MCCL has supported the passage of many pieces of lifesaving legislation. These include, but are not limited to, parental notice for minors seeking an abortion; informed consent, including information on fetal pain and the offering of pain reducing drugs for the unborn child during an abortion; abortion reporting requirements, and providing grants to organizations that offer positive alternatives to abortion. **Will you vote to** maintain previously passed MCCL-supported laws and provisions?

MCCL has a proven record of lifesaving victories at the Legislature, each carefully crafted to further our strategic plan for creating a pro-life Minnesota. This strategic plan involves an incremental approach which allows for the greatest number of lives saved while working toward our ultimate goal of establishing respect for human life in our laws and culture. **Will you vote** for lifesaving legislation that advances MCCL's incremental approach and provides protections for the unborn and their mothers?

Even many who support abortion are opposed to taxpayer funding of abortion. Will you vote to limit and to prohibit taxpayer funding of abortion in Minnesota?

Biological-related technologies have been advancing rapidly in recent years. While most of these developments offer great promise, some require that another human life at an early stage of development be harmed or killed

(e.g., embryonic stem cell research, human cloning). Do you believe that the state should provide protections for nascent humans against biological research and technologies?


MCCL has worked with elected officials to protect vulnerable Minnesotans and those who are nearing the end of their lives. Many protective laws have been passed including a prohibition on assisting suicide or assisting an attempted suicide (MN Statute 609.215), and a provision requiring health care providers to "take all reasonable steps" to comply with requests for nutrition, hydration or health care that "has a significant possibility of sustaining" a patient's life and allowing for transfer of such patients to receive care elsewhere if the provider is unwilling to provide the care (MN Statute 145C.15). **Will you** vote against any attempt to weaken or rescind the MCCL-supported laws cited above?

Legislation was introduced to legalize assistedsuicide(S.F. 1572/H.F. 1885) for certain individuals. Will you vote against any attempts to legalize assisted suicide in Minnesota?

MCCLrespectstherightofpatientsand/or their proxies to make medical decisions. Additionally, MCCL is opposed to any efforts that seek to force medical decisions on others which are based on quality of life criteria. **Will you** oppose efforts that replace the patient (or proxy) with government standards in regard to medical decision-making, resulting in rationing of care?

REMEMBER—You may register to vote by absentee ballot or on Election Day at your local polling location, as long as you are a U.S. citizen at least 18 years old and can provide proof of residence. You will need to provide one of the following with your current name and address: driver's license, state ID card, student photo ID, tribal ID, or an expired photo ID, or a current utility bill or student fee statement. Voting by absentee ballot

The General Election is Tuesday, Nov. 6. You may vote by absentee ballot for any reason.

The easiest way to vote by absentee ballot is to do so in person, at your county auditor or city or township clerk's office. Contact your county auditor for details. If you would rather mail in your ballot, you can order your absentee ballot online. You will need a witness when you fill out your ballot.

Instructions for absentee voters who vote through the mail can be found at the Minnesota Secretary of State website, www.mnvotes.org—click on Other Ways to Vote.

Governor, state office candidates respond to survey

- 1. MCCL has supported the passage of many pieces CANDIDATE of lifesaving legislation. These include, but are not limited to, parental notice for minors seeking an abortion; informed consent, including information on fetal pain and the offering of pain reducing drugs for the unborn child during an abortion; abortion reporting requirements, and providing grants to organizations that offer positive alternatives to abortion. Do you support these previously passed MCCL-supported laws and provisions?
- 2. MCCL has a proven record of lifesaving victories at the Legislature, each carefully crafted to further our strategic plan for creating a pro-life Minnesota. This strategic plan involves an incremental approach which allows for the greatest number of lives saved while working toward our ultimate goal of establishingrespect for human life in our laws and culture. for nascent humans against biological research and technologies?

5.MCCLhasworkedwithelectedofficialstoprotect vulnerable Minnesotans and those who are nearing the end of their lives. Many protective laws have been passed including a prohibition on assisting suicide or assisting an attempted suicide (MN Statute 609.215), and a provision requiring health care providers to "take all reasonable steps" to comply with requests for nutrition, hydration or health care that "has a significant possibility of sustaining" a patient's life and allowing for transfer of such patients to receive care elsewhere if the provider is unwilling to provide the care (MN Statute 145C.15). Do you support the

MCCL-supported laws cited above?

6. Legislation was introduced to legalize assisted suicide (S.F. 1572/H.F. 1885) for certain individuals. Do you oppose the legalization of assisted suicide in Minnesota, and will you work with MCCL (as appropriate to the office you are seeking) to stop assisted suicide?

7. MCCL respects the right of patients and/or their proxies to make medical decisions. Additionally, MCCL is opposed to any efforts that seek to force medical decisions on others which are based on quality of life criteria. **Do you oppose efforts that replace** the patient (or proxy) with government standards in regard to medical decision-making, resulting in rationing of care?

8. As a grassroots advocacy organization that is committed to working within the legislative and judicial processes, MCCL has always had an interest in issues that affect elections. We are strongly committed to maintaining free-speech rights in order to maximize our ability to communicate with our members and the public without restrictive administrative burdens, and we support fair, secure elections between competing candidates. Do you share MCCL's commitment to maintaining free-speech rights for non-profits and PACs and to insisting on fair, secure elections between competing candidates? MCCL

in difficult circumstances and offer lifeaffirming alternatives to abortion. **Tens of** thousands of women statewide have since been helped through the Positive Alternatives program.

► The number of abortions performed on Minnesota minors peaked in 1980 at 2,327. In 1981 Minnesota passed a law requiring that both parents be notified at least 48 hours before an abortion is performed. Minor abortions have since plummeted 89 percent to just 248 in 2017.

WE CAN DO SO MUCH MORE

Thousands of Minnesotans are alive today who

would have been killed in utero if not for pro-life laws. Those laws continue to save lives from abortion every day.

But they would not exist if we had not elected prolife candidates to public office. **And no new pro-life** laws can be enacted if we do not elect pro-life can**didatesin 2018.** In recent years, many pro-life efforts in Minnesota—including bills banning taxpayer funding of abortion and protecting pain-capable unbornchildren—failed precisely because voters had chosen candidates who support abortion.

Progress has been made, but abortion remains the supreme injustice in Minnesota. We have an opportunity to do so much more beginning on Nov. 6. MCCL

Information is limited in judicial races

EVERY ELECTION SEASON, many pro-life voters ask MCCL about where judicial candidates stand on the right to life. Unfortunately, there isn't much we can tell them.

In the past, MCCL distributed a questionnaire to candidates running for judicial office. We don't do so any more because hardly any candidates responded (even those who we knew would vote to uphold pro-life laws). Judicial candidates are reluctant to express personal opinions. A judge's political and policy views, after all, are irrelevant

to the faithful application of the law.

That means our information about judicial candidates is limited. MCCL can only provide the facts we have and let pro-life voters make their **own judgments.** You may wish to look into the candidates (or try to contact them) yourself.

Why judges matter

What kind of judges should we vote for? Good judges-whether at the state or federal level-apply the law and the Constitution as it actually is, not as they want it to be. Judges who stray from the law have caused devastating harm.

In the case of Doe v. Gomez, for example, the Minnesota Supreme Court wrongly held that the state Constitution requires taxpayer funding of abortion. Many lives have been lost in Minnesota as a result.

That's why judicial elections matter. MCCL




