## Lawsuit against pro-life laws moves forward

*Challenge to protective measures could take 12-18 months*

### A LAWSUIT AIMING TO STRIKE DOWN

numerous abortion-related laws in Minnesota has taken its first step forward. The case, Doe v. Minnesota, received an initial court hearing on Oct. 30. It is expected to take 12 to 18 months to reach its resolution.

**“This lawsuit targets commonsense and lifesaving measures that help protect and empower pregnant women and their unborn children,”** says MCCL Executive Director Scott Fischbach. “The courts should not go along with this legally groundless effort to wipe protections off the books.”

### Commonsense measures targeted

The targeted Minnesota laws include, among others, **Woman's Right to Know, which ensures informed consent prior to abortion; parental notification, which ensures that parents are notified before a minor undergoes abortion;** abortion data reporting, which requires that basic data about abortion in Minnesota is collected; and the physician-only requirement, which requires that people who perform abortions be physicians.

The suit—which was brought by local abortion activists represented by Gender Justice and the Lawyering Project—was filed on May 29 in Ramsey County District Court. The state of Minnesota filed a response on Sept. 25 arguing that the case should be dismissed. **“The plaintiffs want to re-write Minnesota law with respect to abortion,”** the state's memo explained. “The courts are not the right vehicle for that effort—the Legislature is.”

## We've done a lot of good

Despite the travesty of Roe v. Wade, the pro-life movement has done a lot of good since then. Pregnant women have been helped and supported. Citizens have been informed and persuaded. Modest pro-life laws (the ones the courts haven't struck down) have been enacted. **And all of these things have helped reduce the number of abortions significantly.**

Yet nearly 10,000 unborn children were still killed in Minnesota last year. Nearly 900,000 are killed nationwide each year. Unborn children are still excluded from the protection of our laws—and allowed to be killed and discarded by an abortion industry devoted to their destruction.

**There is no injustice in American society today that is quite like abortion.** So, while lives have been saved and pro-life efforts have done tremendous good, there is so much more to do!

## Every effort makes a difference

We are hopeful that, in the not-too-distant future, the Court will fully or at least partially overturn Roe v. Wade. The 2020 presidential election will probably have something to do with that. (It's crucial to have a president who nominates good justices to fill vacancies on the Court.) Overturning Roe would allow states to provide greater legal protection for unborn children and their mothers. It would save a lot of lives.

**But whatever the future holds, we will keep working.** We will keep changing hearts and minds. We will keep trying to make our laws more protective of human life. We will keep striving to make abortion unthinkable. Every little effort makes a difference.

## Assisted suicide bill receives hearing in Minnesota

**A MINNESOTA HOUSE COMMITTEE** held an informational hearing Sept. 11 on a bill to legalize assisted suicide in Minnesota. **The legislation would authorize doctors to prescribe lethal drugs so that patients can intentionally end their lives.**

“Assisted suicide is a danger to all of us,” says MCCL Executive Director Scott Fischbach. “Contrary to the assertions of activists trying to generate public support for this bill, legalizing assisted suicide would pose real risks to Minnesotans.”

H.F. 2152, authored by Rep. Mike Freiberg (DFL-Golden Valley), was heard by the Health and Human Services Policy Committee. The hearing was only informational; no vote was taken. Similar legislation has been proposed in recent years but has never advanced out of a legislative committee.

“People who are at risk of suicide deserve our protection,” says Fischbach. **“Those facing an adverse prognosis or the challenges of disability deserve our protection no less than physically healthy and able-bodied people. We all matter.”**

### U.S. abortions continue downward trend

In September, the Guttmacher Institute released its latest report on the incidence of abortion in the United States. Guttmacher, a research organization closely aligned with the abortion industry, surveys abortion centers directly and compiles the most comprehensive national abortion data available. (The Centers for Disease Control releases national abortion numbers based on reports from state health departments, but not every state reports abortion data.)

**In 2017, according to the new Guttmacher findings, 862,000 abortions were performed, a drop from 1.06 million in 2011 and the peak of 1.6 million in 1990.** The abortion rate (abortions per 1,000 women of reproductive age) fell from 16.9 in 2011 to 13.5 in 2017, which is lower than at any time since the 1973 Roe v. Wade decision legalizing abortion.

Many factors have likely contributed to this long-term pro-life trend, including ultrasound technology, pro-life education, protective laws, and the life-affirming work of pregnancy care centers.

### Planned Parenthood fires president

The Planned Parenthood Federation of America fired its president, Dr. Leana Wen, in July—reportedly because she did not adequately prioritize abortion advocacy and aggressive political engagement. **“[Planned Parenthood’s] leadership has determined that the priority of Planned Parenthood moving forward is to double down on abortion rights advocacy,” Wen explained in a departure memo.**

The organization’s priorities were already clear. Planned Parenthood performed 332,757 abortions in 2017 (an increase of more than 11,000 over the previous year), according to the group’s latest annual report, and took in a record \$1.67 billion in revenue during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2018. But while revenue has increased 59 percent since 2009, non-abortion services have declined. Contraceptive services have dropped 32 percent since 2009, while cancer screenings (mostly manual breast exams and pap tests) have fallen 66 percent.

**In Minnesota, Planned Parenthood performed a record-high 6,292 abortions in 2018, a 44 percent jump since 2013, according to the Department of Health.** **MCCL**

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# DID YOU KNOW?

*How a Court decision 24 years ago imposed tax-funded abortion in Minnesota*

**THE U.S. SUPREME COURT'S ROE V. WADE** and Doe v. Bolton decisions in 1973 made abortion legal across the United States. **But a court ruling here in Minnesota—24 years ago this month—went even further.**

## Lawsuit leads to abortion funding

It started in 1993. That's when an abortion advocacy group filed a lawsuit challenging Minnesota's ban on taxpayer funding of abortion.

The lawsuit led to a 1994 decision by a Hennepin County District Court judge, who ruled that women have a "privacy right" to abortion under the Minnesota Constitution—and that the right to equal protection entails that the government, which pays for prenatal care for low-income women, must also pay for abortions for low-income women.

**The Minnesota Supreme Court then upheld and broadened that ruling in its Doe v. Gomez decision on Dec. 15, 1995.**

According to Doe v. Gomez, the Minnesota Constitution, like the U.S. Constitution according to Roe v. Wade, requires legalized abortion. But Doe also requires public funding of abortion for women receiving state assistance—something not required at the national level under Roe.


## Devastating results

Doe, then, was a genuinely extreme decision. The results of that ruling have been horrific.

**In 2017, taxpayers bankrolled a record-high 4,356 abortions at a cost of \$1.06 million, according to the Minnesota Department of Human Services.**

State-funded abortions have risen each of the last four years—a 28 percent jump since 2013.

Taxpayer funding gives the abortion industry an easy revenue stream by allowing it to offer “free” abortions to economically vulnerable women. It keeps the number of abortions higher than it would otherwise be. **Women, children, and taxpayers all pay a price.**

In 2011 and 2017, MCCL helped pass legislation that would challenge Doe v. Gomez by prohibiting taxpayer funding of abortion, but both bills were vetoed by the governor. The Doe decision is currently the basis for a lawsuit aiming to strike down numerous pro-life laws in Minnesota (see page 1). **MCCL**

## Fischbach steps back from Federal PAC; wife launches campaign for Congress

**AS OF SEPT. 1, 2019**, MCCL Executive Director Scott Fischbach no longer has a role with the MCCL Federal PAC (political action committee). His wife, Michelle, has launched a campaign for Congress. **While Scott will continue to serve as executive director of MCCL, Inc., he can no longer have any role with the Federal PAC due to Federal Election Commission campaign finance laws.**

Michelle Fischbach announced her candidacy for Congress in Minnesota's 7th District on Sept. 3 after serving as a state senator, president of the Minnesota Senate, and lieutenant governor. **During her tenure in the Legislature, she cast 149 pro-life votes out of a possible 149—a 100 percent career pro-life voting record.**

The 7th Congressional District seat is currently held by Rep. Collin Peterson, who has a 71 percent pro-life voting record in the current term (as of Dec. 2), according to the National Right to Life Committee. **MCCL**





### Pro-abortion campaign launched

The plaintiffs cite the Minnesota Supreme Court's Doe v. Gomez ruling in 1995 (see page 4) to bolster their claim that Minnesota's pro-life laws are unconstitutional. Activists have also formed a coalition, called Unrestrict Minnesota, to try to generate public support for the lawsuit.

"Similarly extreme lawsuits have succeeded elsewhere," Fischbach says. "But this 'Unrestrict Minnesota' campaign is simply at odds with the views and values of most Minnesotans." **MCCL**


